Priorities for September 2018

We are already thinking about September! Our school priorities will be around:

- 1. Strengthening understanding and teaching of maths- particularly around number and place value. We'll be adopting a mastery approach, which is akin to Singapore Maths, but still includes strong elements of reasoning and problem solving.
- Assessment we are looking to refine our assessment processes further, with a standard 'NFER' test being
 introduced in every year group, three times per year. Parents will be informed of results alongside our teacher
 assessment system. We will avoid being a test-based school, but need to use the tests and results to ensure we
 have accurate teacher assessment judgments.
- 3. Reading how can we further develop our children's vocabulary and inference skills? We also want to foster a greater love of reading, which is vital for more imaginative writing and understanding the high expectations in reading comprehensions.
- 4. Introducing HeartSmart a resource to build emotional resilience and empathy in our pupils.
- 5. Helping parents help our pupils how can we empower and educate parents with how pupils learn at each phase in their education? Be prepared to be invited into school more to learn with your child!

Need some ideas of what to do over the summer?
