Add - 'ed' suffix

e.g. I kick the ball.

He kicked the ball.

The suffix 'ed' is added to the end of verbs to show that something has already happened...

Can you add 'ed' to these words, then put them in a sentence?

e.g. walk – I walked to the shops.

lick	listen	watch
bang	play	sprint

With your grown-up have a go at playing the tense game. Take it in turns to think of a verb (doing word) and put it into a sentence. Your partner needs to listen carefully. If it has the 'ed' suffix (yesterday I kicked a ball) then point over your shoulder to show it has happened in the past. If it's a verb that is happening right now (I am going to the shops) then you need to act out the sentence!
