Injury from the animals whilst handling. - Pecks - Scratches - Wing flap - Bites	Staff, Students, Parents, Visitors	2	1	2	 Anyone, including students, handling the animals are trained and/or assisted by competent staff in the correct handling and restraint procedure. Do not hold the animals near your face when handling. Do not run whilst handling the animals. Do not handle the rabbits unless absolutely necessary. Keep noise level to a minimum when handling the animals. Claws are trimmed as necessary. Any animals that are consistently aggressive towards the children will be re-homed. Any injuries from the animals are washed and immediately attended to by a first aid trained member of staff.

Wear gloves if handling any sharp or splintered wood. Report any maintenance issues immediately to senior staff. Keep walkways to and from the gazebo clear of unnecessary debris, clutter, and equipment. Keep the gazebo clear of any unnecessary debris, clutter, and equipment. Suitable footwear must be worn on the farm. Running is not permitted at any time on the farm or in the gazebo.

Staff, Students, Parents, Visitors	1	4	4	 Anyone with known allergies or respiratory issues are not permitted to handle the animals. Students are reminded in their hygiene and safety briefing to let a member of staff know if they feel unwell at any point during or after handling the animals. The towels used for animal handling are to be washed regularly to prevent the build up or fur and dirt.
Animal Escapes	Staff, Students, Visitors, Animals	2	1	2	 The chickens are not to be taken out of the run for animal handling due to the high risk of escape. Animals must be held securely when transporting to and from their runs and the gazebo. Ideally by using a pet carrier. Only staff members are permitted to transport animals to and from their runs and the gazebo. Animals are not to be left unattended when in the animal handling gazebo. Children are not to be left unattended whilst handling the animals. A staff member must be present and watching. The gate to the farm must be closed when handling the animals. Any animals showing symptoms of stress must be immediately returned to their runs. Animals must be handled following the correct procedure. I.e., placed on children's laps.
